## The Tradition Begins, Again: Tellepsen to Level Cornerstone at Tellepsen Family Downtown YMCA

Tellepsen Family Downtown YMCA and the Houston Masonic Library and Museum Foundation Host Special Ceremony

HOUSTON (October 13, 2009) – For centuries, honoring magnificent new building projects with the leveling of a cornerstone was a tradition passed down from generation to generation; yet the cause seems to have been lost in time, especially in Houston, where such time-honored ceremonies rarely, if ever, occur. On October 20, 2009 at 9:00AM at the Tellepsen Family Downtown YMCA construction site at 808 Pease St., as part of a renewed cornerstone-laying commitment made by Tellepsen, the Houston builder, the tradition will begin anew.

In conjunction with the Houston Masonic Library and Museum Foundation and the YMCA of Greater Houston, Tellepsen will further its reputation as a "Cornerstone of the Community" by placing a new building cornerstone at the YMCA, a renewal of tradition the company intends to make available for its building projects moving forward, says Howard T. Tellepsen, Jr., third-generation Tellepsen and Chairman and CEO.

"In years past, laying a cornerstone at a building was an inspirational event, cherished by the organizations and communities that supported them," said Howard Tellepsen, Jr. "Our goal is to rebuild that sense of history and importance into every Tellepsen construction project. We decided to renew this tradition as part of our centennial commemoration early in the year, and after opening the 86-year-old time capsule in September that my grandfather placed in the Masonic Temple Building, we became all the more certain we wanted all of our clients to have the opportunity to experience that same excitement, pride, and purpose."

Tellepsen and the YMCA agreed to place a cornerstone in the new downtown building to honor the contribution of the YMCA to Houston and the long relationship between the two organizations for the past century.

"Our relationship began in 1910 when the founder of Tellepsen, Tom Tellepsen, took drafting classes at the Houston YMCA," said Clark Baker, President and CEO of the YMCA of Greater Houston. "Our organizations have maintained a wonderful relationship throughout the years, so our designation as the first project in Tellepsen's renewed cornerstone laving tradition is truly an honor."

Randon Reaves, Chairman of the Houston Masonic Library and Museum Foundation, along with Howard T. Tellepsen, Jr. and Clark Baker, will share the rich history and significance of cornerstone laying along with more details about the history that the Tellepsen family and the YMCA share. The Houston Masons will perform a centuries-old cornerstone leveling ceremony as part of the event.
